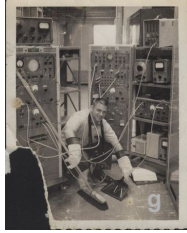

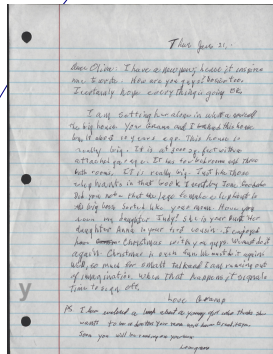


The Teaching Years, 1970s, George Mason HS. Feel the **EXCITEMENT!**

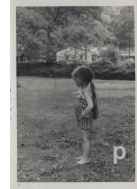

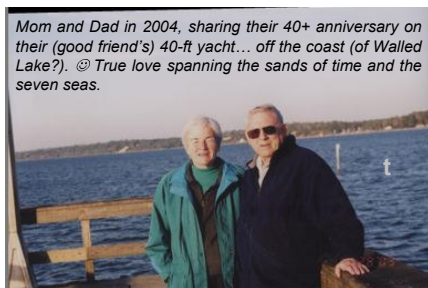

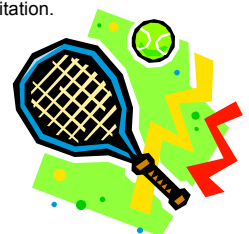
